FEATURED SPEAKERS

DR. DAN MORRILL

Dr. Dan Morrill, the most senior member of the UNC Charlotte faculty in terms of years of service, has also served as Consulting Director of the local Historic Landmarks Commission since 1974. He has conducted extensive research on Charlotte-Mecklenburg history and has written more than 100 Survey and Research

Reports on prospective historic landmarks. Recently, he published a new book, "Historic Charlotte: An Illustrated History." He has also administered design review over restoration projects, has overseen the renovation of istoric structures, and

historic structures, and has prepared nominations for the National

Register of Historic Places. Dr. Morrill draws on his extensive knowledge when teaching undergraduate courses in historic preservation.

Dr. Morrill will describe and explain the major themes in Charlotte-Mecklenburg history. He will focus upon local imperatives for economic growth and development and demonstrate how racial attitudes and arrangements have changed to serve those ends.

DR. JEANNEINE JONES

Jeanneine P. Jones is an Associate Professor of Middle Grades Education at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte where she serves as Chair of the Department of Middle Grades,

Secondary, and K-12 Education.

Prior to graduation from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro (M.Ed. and Ed.D.), she taught eighth grade English language arts and social studies for fifteen years at Western Alamance Middle School

The former author of the *Teacher to Teacher* column in NMSA's *Middle School Journal*, she

has published numerous articles, columns, and textbook chapters on her teaching experiences and research. She currently serves as co-editor of the state's *Middle School Journal*. In addition, she has worked with many schools and districts across the state to facilitate their improved implementation of middle school programs, concepts, and English Language Arts (ELA) content.

Jones' presentation, "You Must be Present to Win: Adult Students Changing the Face of Higher Education," promises to offer valuable information for adult students and professionals alike

Newman Award for Excellence in Graduate Study. Currently Newton is enrolled in the Educational Foundations and Cultural Studies doctoral program at UNC Greensboro. Her research interests include critical pedagogy, women's studies, and discourse analysis.

In her presentation, "Transcendent Narratives of Student Community: The NC Women's History Quilt Project," Newton and students from the class will offer their impressions about the class and the quilt project. The NC Women's History Quilt will be on display.
